ASIAN AMERICAN-PACIFIC ISLANDERS HISTORY TOPIC FOR APPLETON LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS

APPLETON, WI — The history of Asian-American and Pacific Islanders in the U.S. is the topic for an upcoming program by the nonpartisan League of Women Voters of Appleton (LWV).

Dr. Monica Rico will present the topic "What Do You Know? What SHOULD You Know?" on Thursday, June 24 at 4 p.m. The program will take place in <u>Jaycee Park</u>, 1200 S. Jefferson St., Appleton, and will be live-streamed on the Appleton LWV <u>Facebook</u> page. The event is open to the public.

Rico, a professor of history at Lawrence University, is the grandchild of Chinese Immigrants to Hawaii.

The history of Asian-American and Pacific Islanders (AAPI) in the U.S. is not taught in public schools or even many colleges, especially in the Midwest. Yet an understanding of this history helps individuals to comprehend the anti-Asian hate that has yet again bubbled up due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Xenophobia and hatred towards Asian immigrants and residents started way before the Chinese Exclusion Act and the Japanese internment during WWII, resulting in massacres and lynchings that are still not well-known cases in history.
