Our Voter Services team is partnering with local event coordinators to have our presence at these events and need volunteers to help make our mission successful.

Our volunteer roles typically include:

- Pick up/ Set up (for outdoor venues Canopy, weights, sandwich board, etc.). 1-2 people; about an hour
- Event Volunteers (help with registration, status checks, answer questions) 2 people, typically in 2-hour shifts
- Take down/Return (for outdoor venues: canopy, weights, sandwich board, etc.). 1-2 people, about an hour

You can sign up for one or all. You get to meet other LWV'ers (most of them are pretty nice)! You get to meet people interested in voting! You get to do your part to protect our democracy!

She is a frequent media commentator on the themes of women's political organization and voting rights, with recent interviews on NPR's All Things Considered, CBS Sunday Morning, and PBS American Experience.

A wine and hors d'œuvres reception at 4:30 p.m. will precede the program, which will begin at 5:45 p.m. Weiss will sign copies of her book following the program.



DEI: Netflix Series Portrays Life 'High on the Hog'

"High On the Hog" is a four-part series of one-hour episodes on Netflix. It tells the influence of Black culture on our present day dining experience. For example, Thomas Jefferson's enslaved chef studied in Paris, and it was there he learned to make mac and cheese and brought the recipe to the States.



The first hour takes place in Africa and in the port where a majority of the captives were shipped out. It talks about the food they had there--okra, rice, yams. It also discusses the human trafficking.

The second hour takes place in South Carolina where the enslaved people introduced their native foods, made do with all the leftover parts the white men wouldn't eat, creating soups and stews. It also tells how important the black people were in growing rice, and how rice made South Carolina rich.

Philadelphia is the site of the third episode and talks about Thomas Jefferson's and George Washington's enslaved chefs and how highly they were prized. It also talks about the Blacks being the first caterers to whites and blacks, and what a fine living they made from it.

Finally, the last episode takes place in Texas, where the first cowboys were black men. "Boy, go get the wood." "Boy, go get the cows." And of course it talks about BBQ!

Very, very informative. There was so much information I never knew about. Really worth watching.

Census Data Shifts Focus to Fair Maps Creation

The task of creating fair legislative maps that will be in place until 2031 begins this month when the 2020 census data is released. The statewide campaign to end the extreme partisan gerrymandering has shifted into high gear, and it's all hands-on- deck to bring an end to a decade of minority control of state government. Here are some ways you can get involved:

August 17 Webinar Sponsored by Common Cause

Senator Jeff Smith and Representative Deb Andraca will be featured speakers at a webinar hosted by Common Cause of Wisconsin. Other panelists include Melody Barnes, an attorney and legal expert with Law Forward, and former state representative Penny Bernard Schaber who is also a member of our League. Webinar participants will have an opportunity to pose questions to the panelists during the 90-minute session. You can <u>register here</u> to attend this virtual event, which will be held from 6:00-7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, August 17.

August 28: Pack the Park for Fair Maps

This event is set for 11:00 a.m. at Bay Beach Park in Green Bay. The featured speakers include LWV-WI Executive Director Debra Cronmiller; Sachin Chheda, Executive Director of the Wisconsin Fair Elections Project; Representative Deb Andraca, co-author of the redistricting reform legislation (AB 389 & SB 395), and former State Senators Dave Hansen and Dan Theno. The host of the event will be comedian Kristin Brey, creator of the entertaining website and YouTube videos "As Goes Wisconsin".

In Appleton, the Fair Maps Bus will be parked downtown to bring attention to the issue of fair maps during the Farmer's Market that morning. Mid-morning, the bus will lead a car caravan up to the rally in Green Bay. Participants are asked to assemble with their cars decorated in the park-and-ride lot on Ballard Road between 9:30 and 9:45 a.m. to meet the Fair Maps bus there, then proceed to Green Bay. Take Action for Fair Maps

The nonpartisan redistricting bills introduced by Sen. Smith and Rep. Deb Andraca have yet to have a public hearing. Write to the members of the Senate Committee on Government Operations: Senators Stroebel (chair), Felzkowski (vice-chair), Bradley, Roys, and Smith to demand a public hearing for SB 395. Also write to the members of the Assembly Committee on State Affairs: Representatives Swearingen (chair), Vorpagel (vice-chair), Kuglitsch, Tauchen, Summerfield, Spiros, Knodl, Brooks, Schraa, Sinicki, Pope, Ohnstad, and McGuire. Urge them to hold a public hearing on AB 389. In addition, you should write or call your own senator and representative and ask them to co-sponsor this legislation that will establish a nonpartisan procedure for redistricting once and for all. You can also sign your name on-line to the Fair Maps petition here.
