VOICE OF THE LEAGUE: Making a Statement

Our League takes an active role in the crucial decisions made by our local governments. Here are two recent examples of official statements made by Jan Quinlan to the Appleton Common Council and Linda Bjella made to the Grand Chute Town Board.

April 5, 2023

Dear Appleton Common Council,

The League of Women Voters of Appleton-Fox Cities supports the proposed College Avenue Lane Reconfiguration pilot project. We have several positions, reached through study and research and the consensus of our members, supporting this proposal.

We support Appleton creating safe and convenient routes for walkers, bicyclists, and people of varying abilities and needs. We support downtown development that encourages employers to locate downtown, provides more housing options, and promotes a welcoming and safe downtown that is accessible for all.

Police reports documenting unsafe conditions on College Avenue are alarming. Many of us have experienced firsthand the traffic speed, traffic gridlock, traffic noise, and lack of safety. We realize that Appleton has tried for years to find solutions to these problems and we appreciate those efforts. Recently, however, the increase in unsafe conditions has turned many residents and visitors away from downtown. Clearly, more needs to be done -- and this College Avenue pilot project is well-researched, well-vetted, and cost-effective.

In order for downtown Appleton to remain the welcoming "heart" of our community, it should be accessible and enjoyable to a wide variety of community members.

For these reasons, we encourage you to vote YES on the College Avenue Lane Reconfiguration pilot project.
