President's Message: Mis- and Disinformation Pose Threats

In an age where information flows abundantly and swiftly through various channels, the challenge of distinguishing between accurate information and misleading content has become more crucial than ever. Misinformation and disinformation pose significant threats to informed decision-making, public discourse, and societal trust. To navigate this complex landscape, it is essential for individuals to develop a keen sense of discernment. Here's a guide on how to identify misinformation and disinformation:

- **1. Check the Source:** Start by examining the source of the information. Reputable news outlets, official government websites, and well-established organizations are generally more reliable. This was an eye-opening exercise for me. I wanted to see what the process of using AI for writing was like. It was astonishingly easy: I went to the ChatGPT website and signed up. There is no cost; you just have to create a profile with a user name (email) and password. Once through that simple two-step process, I requested an essay on misinformation and disinformation. Click.

One second later, this is what appeared. It is well written and organized, and contained a lot of really helpful tips. This was not content pulled from the Internet. It was original content.

But, it made me wonder — how many Al-generated, well written, plausible, articles have I read and believed to be legitimate? It is truly something to ponder, especially in a crucial election year.


The Who, How and What: Concerns Over AI

Al is now the most downloaded app of all time, with more than 100 million people using it every week.

Imagine the impact AI could have on our political process — for good or for misinformation. It is easy to use, saves time, and is free or affordable. That's the positive side. Of concern are data and privacy issues, the potential for AI to promote incorrect or inaccurate information, and how easily it can be manipulated.

Consider these numbers reported from a November 2023 poll conducted by the Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research and the University of Chicago Harris School of Public Policy that indicate growing concern over the rapid advances of generative Artificial Intelligence threatening to amplify the influence of misinformation on 2024 presidential election. Of those interviewed:





53% will use chatbots to learn about candidates or ballot issues

62% believe candidates will use AI to tailor political ads to individual voters 83% think candidates will use AI to create false or misleading images or videos for political ads

PROGRAMS: Priority Issue Rises to Top at Lively Issues

Can you believe our area weather? After the snow peoples came with 13" of joy causing us to delay our Lively Issues program, there has been a drought. While some rejoice in this, we all know that the culprit is climate change. Let's hope that the snow people won't want to make visits in April and May to compensate for their current absence.

Lively Issues was a success. We had about 34 attend the event. This year we began the conversation by outlining some of the conclusions of the 2023-2024 Position Review Through a DEI and Regional Lens Study. Review Study Team Chair Jan Quinlan outlined the team's process and highlighted the positions the team felt needed revisiting. There is one topic which the Review Team deemed a number one priority: Public Safety/Local Police Protection (1973) and Regional Law Enforcement (1994) positions. We are pleased that those in attendance agreed with us.

The other issues the Review Study Team thought needed attention are:

- Local government positions
- City Governmental Structure, Town Government (1961,1965, 1967, 1969, 1980, 1991; Annexation 1989)
- County Government: Financial Planning (1974)
- County Government: Organization & Function (1975)
- Solid Waste (1969) and Recycling (1990) positions
- Housing (1995) positions which have gaps even when including those embedded within Natural Resource positions: "Climate Resilience and Vulnerable Populations" (2021)
- Local Transportation (1998) positions

Those attending Lively Issues aided by offering some specific issues they thought need to be included in the upcoming study as well as highlighting other issues and concerns. The results will be distributed via email to the members soon.

We, along with all other Wisconsin Leagues, are co-sponsors of the Tuesday, **February 13** (6:30 - 8:00 p.m.) "**Environmental Justice: Systemic Problems/Collaborative Solutions**" program being hosted by the LWV La Crosse Area. You can register for this event via our website or use the link provided in the email about the event.

Of importance to our League is the **Monday, March 18** Consensus meeting. The Review Study Team will present the findings and recommendations of our yearlong assessment of all our local positions.

To refresh everyone's memory, members atttending the May 2023 Annual Meeting charged us to assess all of our positions with a Fox Cities regional perspective and diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) lens. The intent is to identify standing positions that need further review, updating, and/or identifying areas that potentially require a future study. As mentioned above, there are a few which the team believes need immediate attention, immediate as within a few years.

However, there are many positions which, with a few added phrases or sentences, can meet our regional and DEI perspectives. These will be detailed at the Consensus meeting. We need your input and knowledge to ensure that proposed changes make sense and follow LWV standards. You will be getting emails from me regarding all the upcoming programs.

Ron Tusler were planning to join us.

Unfortunately, that evening we experienced technical difficulties. Legislators and guests alike had challenges signing in. In the end, four of the five legislators were able to join us. Ultimately, this Town Hall was another highly informative session as the elected representatives responded thoughtfully to questions about pending Wisconsin legislation. There was also a new dynamic with more than one Democratic legislator on hand to articulate their priorities.

If you were one of the guests who had difficulty signing in, our apologies. To those of you who were able to join us, thanks for your patience, perseverance, and understanding. And, special thanks to our elected officials who agreed to participate that evening.

Our next Legislative Town Hall will be in February 2025, and we're already preparing for smoother sailing for us all.

State Legislature Passes Maps; Dismantles 2011 Partisan Gerrymander

On February 13, the Wisconsin State Legislature passed the maps Governor Evers sent to the Supreme Court for consideration in Clarke v. WEC. The Governor's maps dismantle the 2011 partisan gerrymander, which guaranteed a dominant majority in the Legislature and thwarted the will of the people. Under the Governor's maps, Wisconsin voters will pick their elected officials - not the other way around. The League calls on Gov. Evers to sign this bill. VOTER SERVICES: DMV Pilot Project Holds Promise

We are working on an exciting project to increase voter registration. Based on the successful format of the Dane County League and Janesville League, we have connected with our local DMV to set up a similar project. Volunteers from other Leagues have been very pleased with the number of citizens they were able to assist in getting registered.

Every DMV has a kiosk dedicated to MyVote.WI.gov. The plan will be to have two trained League volunteers who will be there to assist voters after they have finished with their DMV business. The Appleton DMV personnel are very positive toward the project.

The tentative plan is to provide training the week of February 19. We intend to start Monday, February 26 and go through Wednesday, March 13—the dates that MyVote.wi.gov is available for registration. The goal is to cover three 1.5 to 2.5 hour sessions each weekday, and one 3-hour session on Saturdays. That works out to 33 volunteers/week (of course, volunteers can opt for more than one day/more than one session). We would hope that volunteers would pick a day of the week that they could commit to for the duration of the pilot project.

At Lively Issues, 18 League members have volunteered to get involved with the project! Once the project is up and running, we will need someone to step up to coordinate this in an ongoing fashion. A zoom meeting will be held with all of them invited to start formalizing the procedures.

ERA: Well, It's About Time!

Mid-Day Women's Alliance (MDWA) and other partner organizations of the Women's Action Coalition (WAC) held a press conference on Monday, February 5 to announce the bill introduction for the Wisconsin State Equal Rights Amendment to our state constitution.



Representative Lori Palmeri from Oshkosh's 54th Assembly District, who is the lead bill author, introduced the proposed amendment, which is much broader than the original ERA, ensuring equal rights for all under the law because "after more than 50 years, it's embarrassing that ANY Wisconsinite has fewer rights than another." Appleton's Representative Lee Snodgrass, co-author, added her support.

One of Appleton's early feminists, Mary Ann Rossi, shared the history of the WI ERA and the local feminist movement with the crowd of more than 50 people, followed by statements from WAC partner organizations. In particular, Linda Bjella spoke on the history of the League of Women Voters, and Alice Paul's role in women's suffrage and the ERA.

We also heard from the generation that will inherit our past and current decisions: Megan Eisenstein, government major from Lawrence University, spoke on the rights she lost with the Dobbs decision because she came to college in Wisconsin vs staying in Illinois, and how she dreams of the day when equal rights will be restored to millions of people in the state.


