Brief Summary of Pros/Cons of the Death Penalty

"Arguments for the Death Penalty" are those most often used to justify the use of the death penalty. "Arguments against the Death Penalty" respond to those positions. These issues can be explored in more detail using the resources provided at www.lwvil.org/death_penalty/.

Arguments for the Death Penalty

1. The death penalty is a deterrent to violent crime.

- 2. Without a death penalty, murder rates would soar.
- 3. To take murder seriously, only the forfeiture of life is adequate punishment.
- 4. Safeguards in our justice system ensure that only guilty persons have been executed.
- 5. The death penalty is fair because it is given only to the worst criminals for the worst crimes.
- 6. The death penalty saves taxpayers thousands of dollars over maintaining people in prison for life.
- 7. Only the death penalty provides closure for families of murder victims.

Responses/Arguments against the Death Penalty

- 1. Studies have fairly consistently concluded that the death penalty does not act as a deterrent.
- 2. Studies show that states without the death penalty have murder rates as low or lower than states with it.
- 3. Only 2% of all murders result in the imposition of the death penalty.
- 4. Over 120 innocent people have been released from death row since 1973, most of these despite the system and not because the system worked.
- 5. The same crime that lands one person on death row may result in a prison term for another. The worst criminals often escape the death penalty because it is used as a bargaining chip.
- 6. Cost analyses have shown that life imprisonment is actually less costly than a death sentence.
- 7. A prison term provides speedier justice for the families of victims. The mandatory appeals process that accompanies a death sentence is very lengthy and postpones the possibility of closure.

8. A high regard for human life leads a civilized society to seek the death penalty.

8. All of the developed world (except the United States), and indeed most of the international community, has determined that the death penalty is a violation of human rights.

Are any states without controversy? Can any state claim with certainty that its death penalty is flawless? Does the fact that all states have issues with their death penalties not suggest that the death penalty be abolished?
