British Colonial Governor of Jamaica

## THE RIGHT HONORABLE LORD CARADON

British statesman Lord Caradon is architect of United Nations
Resolution 242, approved in 1967 and the basis for all subsequent
international negotiations concerning Israel and the Arab countries.
Resolution 242, drafted while Lord Caradon was British Ambassador to the
United Nations, has two major premises: it calls for withdrawal of Israeli
armed forces from territory occupied during the six day war in 1967; and
a recognition of the right of every state in the area to peace within
secure and recognized boundaries. The New York Times article on the
unaminous passage of 242 noted that "Lord Caradon's careful spadework led
to the acceptance of the resolution by the United Arab Republic, Jordan
and Israel."

Lord Caradon was Minister of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs and United Kingdom Representative at the United Nations from 1964 to 1970. He was President of the Security Council three times, and in the Council outlasted five United States Ambassadors and three Soviet Ambassadors. He helped to draft the nuclear non-proliferation treaty and has continued to serve as special envoy for the U.N., travelling widely in Africa and the Mideast. "There is nothing wrong with the United Nations except the members," he says, "and their refusal to use it as an instrument of peace."

Lord Caradon, the former Sir Hugh Foot, was created a Life Peer in 1964 and is a member of a distinguished British family. He is the son of a former liberal M.P. and Minister in the British Government. Two of his brothers have served in Parliament, and one of them, Michael Foot, leader of the House of Commons.

Born in Plymouth on October 8, 1907, Hugh Mackintosh Foot was educated at a Quaker School and at St. John's College, Cambridge, where he was President of the Cambridge Union, a debating society. On leaving Cambridge, Lord Caradon entered the Colonial Service and was posted to Palestine as an Administrative Officer. He spent 15 years in the Arab States during the troubled 1920's and 30's and once walked from the Mediterranean to Damascus by himself.

Lord Caradon, who calls himself one of the last of the colonialists and the first of the internationalists, served for 35 years in the British Colonial Service. He was the last Governor of Cyprus and paved the way for that country's independence and the halt of guerrilla terrorism. He was also the last colonial Governor of Nigeria, when that most populous country in Africa was on the verge of independence, and played a major part in the preparation of the first federal constitution. He was Governor of Jamaica and worked closely with the leaders of the former British Caribbean colonies to achieve a West Indies Federation among the English-speaking islands.

As a result of his work in all these areas, Lord Caradon sees himself as "an expert in international frustration" and goes on to say that "I have no illusions but I am not disillusioned. I believe in the obligation of optimism."

Lord Caradon, whose home is in Cornwall, has been married to Florence Sylvia Tod since 1936. They have three sons and a daughter. Lord Caradon is author of <u>A Start in Freedom</u> about his experiences in the Colonial Service and at the United Nations. He is a Fellow of the Adlai Stevenson Institute for International Affairs in Chicago, and spent the 1977-78 academic year as a Senior Fellow at the Woodrow Wilson School of Princeton University.

As a Visiting Fellow for the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation, Lord Caradon has visited Kenyon College, Oklahoma Baptist University, St. Olaf College (from which he later received an honorary doctorate), Centenary College (to which he returned to give a commencement address), Middlebury, Davidson, Washington and Lee, and Drew University. In addition to discussing such trouble spots as the Middle East, Cyprus, and Africa, he is concerned about world population control, on which he recently attended a conference in Sri Lanka, and in problems of universal human rights. As a foreigner who has spent much time in the United States, he can also tell students and faculty how American culture and institutions appear to the rest of the world.
